There are no direct costs to the public regarding licensing veterinarians. The only costs imposed are on the applicants for licensure.

Costs incurred to execute and enforce Chapter 811 are borne by the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and the Iowa Board of Veterinary Medicine. The major cost is staff time. Staff and estimated percentage of time allocated is as follows; Executive Secretary of the Iowa Board of Veterinary Medicine (State Veterinarian) 15% FTE, Program Planner 2 60% FTE, and two Compliance Investigators 40% each (one Compliance Investigator 80% FTE). Other costs associated would include, but are not limited to, hiring expert witnesses, costs associated with hearings, legal staff, and office supplies.

The costs justify the process to ensure that licenses are issued to qualified and competent veterinarians.

REGULATORY ANALYSIS

1. Persons affected by the proposed rule

Classes of persons that will bear the costs of the proposed rule:

Veterinarians seeking licensure in Iowa.

Classes of persons that will benefit from the proposed rule:

Citizens of Iowa that need to seek the services of veterinarians. Because Veterinarians are an integral part of food safety, the public can be assured that livestock are raised, treated and harvested in a humane way. Veterinarians would also benefit from this proposed rule.

2. Impact of the proposed rule, economic or otherwise, including the nature and amount of all the different kinds of costs that would be incurred

Quantitative description of impact:

Costs associated with this rule are the licensing fees and associated costs to obtain a veterinary license in lowa. These costs are borne by the veterinarians seeking an lowa license.

Qualitative description of impact:

The rule requires certain education, examination, and/or certification requirements be met before obtaining a license to practice veterinary medicine.

3. Costs to the state

Implementation and enforcement costs borne by the agency or any other agency:

Costs incurred to execute and enforce Chapter 811 are borne by the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and the Iowa Board of Veterinary Medicine. The major cost is staff time. Staff and estimated percentage of time allocated is as follows; Executive Secretary of the Iowa Board of Veterinary Medicine (State Veterinarian) 15% FTE, Program Planner 2 60% FTE, and two Compliance Investigators 40% each (one Compliance Investigator 80% FTE). Other costs associated would include, but are not limited to, hiring expert witnesses, costs associated with hearings, legal staff, and office supplies.

Anticipated effect on state revenues:

Minimal. The license application process requires applicants to pay a fee to mitigate some of the costs to the State to review and approve license applications.

Inaction or not licensing veterinarians would have a huge negative impact in lowa on the quality of veterinarians practicing and the effects it would have on pets and livestock.
